### ROBERT (BOB) H. GORDON and JOYCE GORDON



Robert (Bob) Gordon was born in Oak Lake, Manitoba, back in 1932. As a young boy, he showed interest in agriculture and actively participated in the family farm business. He was a member of the Oak Lake 4-H Beef Club, which, one day, introduced him to his future wife, Joyce.

Joyce, too, grew up as a 4-H member, actively participating in the Carroll 4-H Beef and Swine Club. It is their 4-H activities that brought Bob and Joyce together. They became great friends and eventually married in 1959 and started their family shortly after that. Bob and Joyce have five children – Lois, Shirley, Sheila, Lynn and Robert - and 10 grandchildren.

Providing for their children and teaching them a strong work ethic was important to them. Their children became the reason for their involvement with the Hereford breed in the early seventies. Both Bob and Joyce recognized the importance of teaching their children the benefits of working with cattle and as a result, something even more profound came about.

Bob was active on the Manitoba Hereford Association Board and was a national board member in 1979. While serving on the national board, Bob had the idea to start a Canadian Junior Hereford Association and made plans to host an inaugural youth event at their family farm. This became an annual event which morphed into our current day national junior show called Bonanza.

Years later, Bob and Joyce's daughters Lois, Shirley, and Sheila helped to orchestrate and plan Bonanza 1981, in Brandon, Manitoba. All of their children are actively involved in the agriculture industry in one form or another today.

As Hereford breeders, the Gordons had tremendous success. Bob was known for his good eye for cattle

and his ability to pick out the 'good ones'. Together, Bob and Joyce found themselves owning many champion cattle that did well in the show ring and sold exceptionally well in the sale ring. Bob's interest in cattle took him across the globe. He marketed, sold, and showed cattle internationally and helped on various trade deals. Bob's eye landed him a dream job working for what is now known as Alta Genetics. The Gordons traveled the country together looking for the next breed changer. There is no doubt that as a team, they were a great match. In 2007, to honor their contributions to the agriculture and beef industry, the Gordons were inducted into the Manitoba Agriculture Hall of Fame.

The Gordons' legacy will continue for many years. The hard work they did to establish Bonanza will last for generations as the program continues to be a success. Sadly, Bob passed away on July 29th, 2016. Joyce continues to be an active member in her community as a resident of Boissevain, Manitoba and attends as many Hereford sales as time permits. The Gordons will forever be remembered for their commitment and passion to the Hereford Breed.
